Think WIDE(N) campaign



The national Neighbourhood Watch Network are currently running an anti-burglary campaign that particularly caught our eye so we wanted to share it with you.

The campaign uses the acronym 'WIDE(N)' as an easy way to remember effective home security measures.

<u>Research from Nottingham Trent University</u> shows that a set combination of security actions provides up to 50 times more protection for your home versus no security. A combination of WIDE actions is the most effective and recommended by police throughout the country:

- W WINDOWS: Keep your windows locked
- I INTERIOR: Put inside lights on a timer/smart bulb
- D DOORS: Double or deadlock your doors
- E EXTERIOR: Put outside lights on a sensor
- (N) NEIGHBOURS: Keep an eye out for your neighbours

CERT Are you registered for updates from the Dorset Alert service?

A General Data Protection Act (GDPR) reminder was issued in December 2021 by the data controller of this service. They advised that you can review and change the Information Providers (organisations) that you have currently chosen to share your data with by clicking the red "settings" button below. This is well worth a few minutes of your time as you may have new options available or wish to remove some.



You are also able to review the "Types" of messages that you receive from this page to ensure that the emails you receive are relevant to your interests.

If you would rather unsubscribe from the entire system you can also do that from the settings page or by emailing unsubscribe@neighbourhoodalert.co.uk. Please bear in mind that if you do that you will be removed from the system entirely.

Dorset Alert is a free community messaging system operated by Dorset Police. The system is designed to allow you to choose the type of information you would like to receive concerning crime and anti-social behaviour, witness appeals, crime prevention, community events and local good news.

Their aim is to send you information where the Police believe to do so will reduce the opportunity for crime and anti-social behaviour or will help Dorset Police to solve a crime. Visit **dorsetalert.co.uk** or call **101** for more information.



Is sex trafficking happening in your neighbourhood?

Thank you to our guest from the charity Purple Teardrop Campaign for writing the following article to help raise awareness of the issues they see women and girls facing in the UK.

Modern day slavery, also called human trafficking, is going on everywhere, including Poole, Bournemouth and very likely Canford Heath.

Victims, usually from poorer countries are enticed to richer countries with promises of a good job and somewhere to live. Women and girls, in particular, are targeted by traffickers, offered jobs in hotels or restaurants, but in reality, they are intended for work in the sex industry.

When they arrive in this country, their passports are taken away from them, they are raped, often beaten and told if they try to escape then the same will happen to their families or that their family members will be killed. They are set up in brothels or massage parlours and forced to have sex with multiple clients every day. They may be imprisoned there or may have some freedom of movement. The threats to their family are usually enough to ensure that they won't run away.

What are the signs that a property is being used for sex trafficking in your neighbourhood?

- o Unusual amount of visitors
- o Premises frequently visited by men
- o A rented house or flat which may be unkempt, seem empty, curtains may be closed during the day
- o Different women appear to live there for short periods of time

o They may look deprived of sleep, medical care, may have signs of physical abuse o They may appear fearful, avoid eye contact, be reticent to talk, may speak little English o They may appear to be in a situation of dependency or control and have a fear of authority

If you think that you may have seen signs of sex trafficking, do report it. It is better to report something that turns out not to be trafficking than not to report it. Yours could be the phone call that rescues a woman or girl from sexual exploitation, abuse and hopelessness.

o Report it on the Modern Day Slavery helpline 0800 0121 700

o In an emergency, call Police on 999, or 111 if not urgent

o Anonymously ring Crimestoppers on 0800 555 111

The Purple Teardrop Campaign is a charity which raises awareness and helps survivors of sex trafficking.





How to contact Dorset Police

Report Crime Online

Report Crime Online is an easy way to give information to Dorset Police or report an incident or crime via their website. Make an enquiry, request a call back or report anti-social behaviour

'Do It Online' is a selection of online services offered by Dorset Police, helping you to report a non-emergency crime or incident, pass a message to an officer or request a call back, make a complaint or give compliments/feedback, submit a Freedom of Information request, or report lost property.

If you would prefer to use the telephone, you can call 101. Contact centre staff are available to answer your calls day or night. However, making use of the online services also helps to reduce the demand on the 101 telephone service, making it quicker and easier for people to speak to a call handler for more complex or urgent issues.
